The year is 1991. The beginning of the massive Jewish immigration wave from the USSR to Israel. 12 years old Misha is documenting his family's journey on a home-video camera. The already traumatic immigration experience is enhanced up to absurd proportions, when the family's old aunt dies on the plane just before they reach the land of their ancestors. Now, the family will have to go through various levels of bureaucracy with an immigrating corpse...

**USA Premiere:** New Israeli Mockumentary



"Lonely Planet" by Edan Zeira Israel. 2012. 86 min, in Hebrew, Russian with English subtitles.

A documentary film crew embarks on an incredible ghost chase, traveling along the Trans-Siberian rails, searching for Mishka. During the Second World War, little Misha in Nazi invaded Belarus ran into the woods, where he spent three solitary years hiding amidst a pack of wolves. The crew members, until they finally meet the boy who lived with wolves, reach some of the most godforsaken parts of the globe and encounter places and people, that seem to have materialized straight out of Gogol's and Dostoyevsky's Russia. The film combines truth and fiction in such a way as not to be seen on the screen.

"The World Is Funny" and wondrously strange in the tender new dramedy from Israeli fabulist Shemi Zarhin.

Full of quirky charm, this ambitious, multistrand tale about storytelling — and a fractured family — unfolds in a friendly Tiberias, Israel, where reality and fantasy cleverly intertwine. Already Israel's top domestic B.O. draw this year, the pic is still in theaters and could do modest arthouse business offshore, especially if it wins the Ophir award for best picture (one of an unprecedented 15 nods) and is named Israel's foreign-language film Oscar submission. Fest play is guaranteed.
